Dr. O'Tool, by Principal Jack, with his pockets crammed with copies of his own Plan for paying off the National Debt without putting any body to a farthing of expense.

Rigdumfunnidos, by Mr. Robert Stephen, with a flag and motto, "We've a serious duty to perform."

The Recruiting Sergeant, by Councillor WHITE, who will appear in the identical uniform which he wore when he was among the Oldmeldrum Volunteers. It is to be "latt'n oot" for the occasion, by the Gordon's Hospital regimental Tailor.

Anacharsis Cloots, by Mr. ALEX. Hogg, with a flag and motto, "An we takna' care we'll be a' Tories in less than twa year."

Lord Noodle's own Barber, by Mr. John Adam, who will appear with razor, soap box, comb, and juggy, ready to operate either as Barber or Ambassador, on the shortest possible notice, and in the best possible manner.

Sir Tunbelly Clumsy, by Councillor Johnston, wearing a cockade, and motto, "This beat's a'!"

Mr Edward Waverley, by Ex-councillor Barron, with a flag exhibiting a beautiful view of a Church in ruins. Motto—"For Kirk, Covenant, and Queen." He and Mr. Andrew Sutherland will appear with the "Constitutional" flag crammed into their breeches pockets.

Coriolanus, by Sir John Forbes, who will be preceded by a blind piper playing "I'll gang nae mair to yon town."
