ALTS 2011: Internationalisation: Sharing good practice from across the University of Aberdeen

The third Annual Learning & Teaching Symposium took place on the 17th May 2011 with the theme *Internationalisation: Sharing Good Practice from across the University of Aberdeen*. Around 60 staff members from diverse disciplines attended to hear guest keynote speakers and examples of good practice, and to discuss ideas related to the topic.



Professor Peter McGeorge, Vice-Principal for Learning & Teaching, opened the Symposium and introduced the first keynote speaker, Dr Janette Ryan. Dr Ryan currently lives in the UK and works part-time for Monash University, Australia as a Senior Lecturer in Pedagogy and Curriculum, teaching online courses to postgraduate students. She is the director of the HE Academy's Teaching International Students project and author of *A Guide to Teaching International Students (2000)*. With Jude Carroll she also co-edited *Teaching International Students: Improving Learning For All (2005)*. She has delivered staff development workshops in the UK, the US, Australia, China and Hong Kong and is currently engaged in a three country collaborative research project with Chinese universities and schools on teaching and learning.

Following on from Dr Ryan's keynote were four showcases of good practice:

- Does self-assessment and tailored intervention help to improve employability skills of Postgraduate Students? Dr Debbi Marais, MSc Coordinator, Population Health
- Washington naval history internships: a perspective on embedded work placements Dr Jackson Armstrong, Lecturer, History

The afternoon's keynote speaker was Terence Perrin from the Association of Graduate Recruiters. Terence worked as HR Manager in the charity/voluntary sector, and for the National Audit Office, before moving to a specialist recruitment role, including graduate recruitment, with Watson Wyatt. Since then he has managed graduate and MBA recruitment for the investment bank Dresdner Kleinwort Wasserstein (DrKW.), a role which had a particular focus on building relationships with universities across Europe, especially the UK, France, Spain, Italy, Germany and the Nordics. In addition he has worked for KPMG, JPMorgan and now works for investment bank BNP Paribas focusing on recruitment across Europe. He has contributed to numerous media articles on graduate, MBA and experienced hire recruitment as well as speaking regularly at conferences on these subject areas. He became Chair of AGR in 2007.
