#### Spanish Fieldtrip, May 2001 Tim Gray

The onslaught of foot and mouth disease earlier this year wreaked havoc upon geological fieldwork across much of the UK, with the effects being felt nowhere more than at the geology department of the University of Aberdeen. Second and third year students reeled the second day however, the third year were to discover that the rain in Spain is very likely to fall in the mountains when mapping, whilst being greeted with news of a heatwave in Aberdeen with temperatures up to 30°C. Apart from mapping tracks, throughout the rest of the week the second and third year alike were

delights as sedimentary logging, Palaeozoic mapping and mineralisation, structure mapping, feature mapping, and mounds of mud. The trip culminated with an attempt to find the biggest mountain in the Pyrenees that one can access with a coach, and climbing

with horror and disbelief as they were informed that they would not be taking part in the standard Easter field excursions to the rainswept areas of Arran and Ballachulish, due to local fears of the spreading epidemic. Student's grievances about missing the opportunity to visit such classic areas of geology were, however, somewhat dispelled upon the announcement of a replacement fieldtrip for both years to the popular coastal resort of Cap Salou, NE Spain. The encouragement from several staff members who stepped forward to offer their services was astonishing and helped to quell any remaining disparity amongst the student fraternity. Adrian Hartley, Jeremy Preston, Gordon Walkden, David Macdonald, Suzanne Miller, Clive Rice, Alan Crane, Titus Haggan and Christoph Zink all modestly regarded their role in this trip as crucial. Selflessly, some even went ahead to check that the Pyrenees were still there.

Greeted by the cruel Spanish sunshine on our first day, there seemed to be a general consensus that we should work on the beach where we could climatise and instigate community relations. On

#### New MSc in Hydrocarbon Enterprise

A brand new MSc in Hydrocarbon Enterprise was launched by Aberdeen University in September 2001. Sponsored by the Larry Kinch Foundation and with course director Dr Bryan Cronin, this new MSc is a world first in cross-faculty taught business and technology courses.

The course provides a broad training

in all areas of International Oil and Gas Exploration and Production, including business and law. Students will leave with an MSc, but will also gain an offshore safety certificate and a recognised certificate in a technical course in one of a choice of languages.

The course units are delivered by University staff plus a range of leading oil industry professionals.

This year the MSc is a full-time study course. Next year it will also comprise part-time units leading to Postgraduate Certificate and Diploma qualifications, as well as individual Continuing Professional Development units available to industry. Studentships are available for eligible applicants.




#### GCB provides Fieldwork Prizes
