Aberdeen Universities' Officers' Training Corps (AUOTC)

Aberdeen University's OTC was formed in 1912, but had only a Medical Unit. Opposition from the local Territorial Force Association and local volunteer units, especially 4th Gordons with its strong 'University (U)' Company, had stymied a simultaneous application to form an Infantry Unit. However, a Medical Unit was a start and very appropriate, given the University's long and distinguished association with Army Medicine.

Although the OTC's students then, as is the case today, had no commitment to serve their country, quite a few of their number volunteered for service and some made the ultimate sacrifice. Their names, and many more from the University Community who died during WW1, can be found in the King's College Chapel War Memorial.

At the outbreak of the First World War, many students and staff of the University volunteered to serve, primarily with the Army, but also with the Royal Navy and the Royal Flying Corps (later the Royal Air Force). The University compiled two records after the First World War; the In Memoriam Roll, now available online, which lists information on the 342 students and staff who died during that conflict and the Roll of Service that contains the names of 2,852 graduates, alumni and students who served during the war in the army, navy or air force or who contributed to the war effort in some other manner – a fitting way to remember those students who voluntarily set aside their academic life – some for years, others for ever – in the service of their country.

Today the UOTC is part of the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst Group. University students participate in unique, challenging, risk-managed military exercises, adventurous training, sports and a plethora of other activities to become robust, confident and motivated leaders of the future. It is worth noting that only a very small percentage of UOTC students join the Army in any capacity, Regular or Reserve. The UOTC develops graduates who have industry-recognised Institute of Leadership and Management and Chartered Management Institute qualifications. More importantly, their practical experience in challenging circumstances enhances their employability.

Aberdeen Universities' Officers' Training Corps recruits from the University of Aberdeen, Robert Gordon University and North East Scotland College. The music in the service is sung by the University of Aberdeen Chapel Choir.

The introit is the 'Introitus' from Tomás Luis de Victoria's *Missa pro Defunctis* (*Mass for the Dead*). Born in Spain in 1548, from the 1580s Victoria worked at a convent in Madrid where he served as chaplain to the Dowager Empress Maria, sister of Philip II of Spain, daughter of Charles V, wife of Maximilian II and mother of two emperors. The *Missa pro Defunctus* was part of the *Officium Defunctorum (Office of the Dead)* which was composed for the funeral of the Empress Maria in 1603.

During the Act of Remembrance, a setting of the *Kyrie eleison (Lord, have mercy)* by American composer Nicholas Palmer will be sung. Although a contemporary piece, it has been written in a Renaissance style.

The Prayer for Peace is a setting of words from the well-known 'Prayer of St Francis'. The prayer is actually an anonymous text, written in 1912, in French, and published in a pious magazine edited by Fr Esther Bouquerel. It was attributed to St Francis of Assisi in 1927 through its having been printed on the back of a picture of the saint. The prayer became widely known here in Britain during the First and Second World Wars and has been set to music by many choral composers, including this one by Fridrik Walker, Director of Music at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Glasgow.

I give to you a new commandment is written by Peter Nardone. Having been born and brought up in Scotland, he went on to become Director of Music at both Chelmsford and Worcester Cathedrals. In the anthem he sets words from the Gospel of John along with the beautiful plainsong of *Ubi caritas* (the ancient hymn used by the Western Church on Maundy Thursday) – by doing so, the Gospel text 'I give you a new commandment that you love one another' sits alongside the beautiful plainsong which tells us that 'Where charity and love are, there God is there.'

ORDER OF SERVICE

At 10.50*am the Clergy, Academic Procession and members of the Officer Training Corps and Air Squadron enter the Chapel. All stand.*
