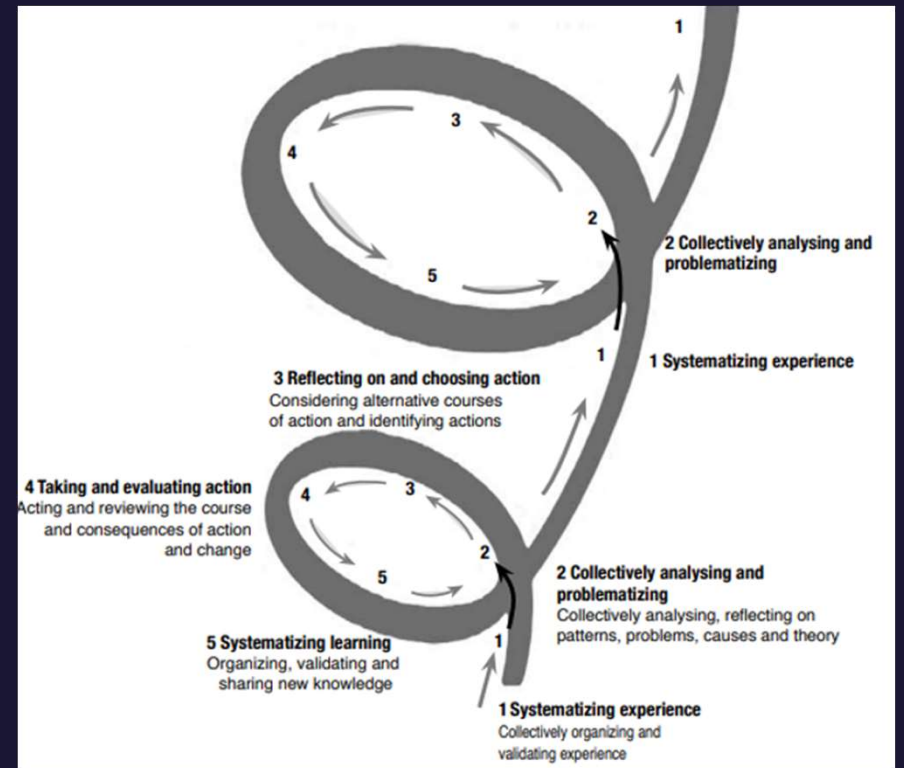

Participatory Action Research, recap

- Theory / practice: “equal distribution of power greatest challenge”
- “PAR ... highlights the importance of subjective experiences in knowledge construction”
- 4 principles: subjective perspectives; homogenous group; collective validation, no delegation

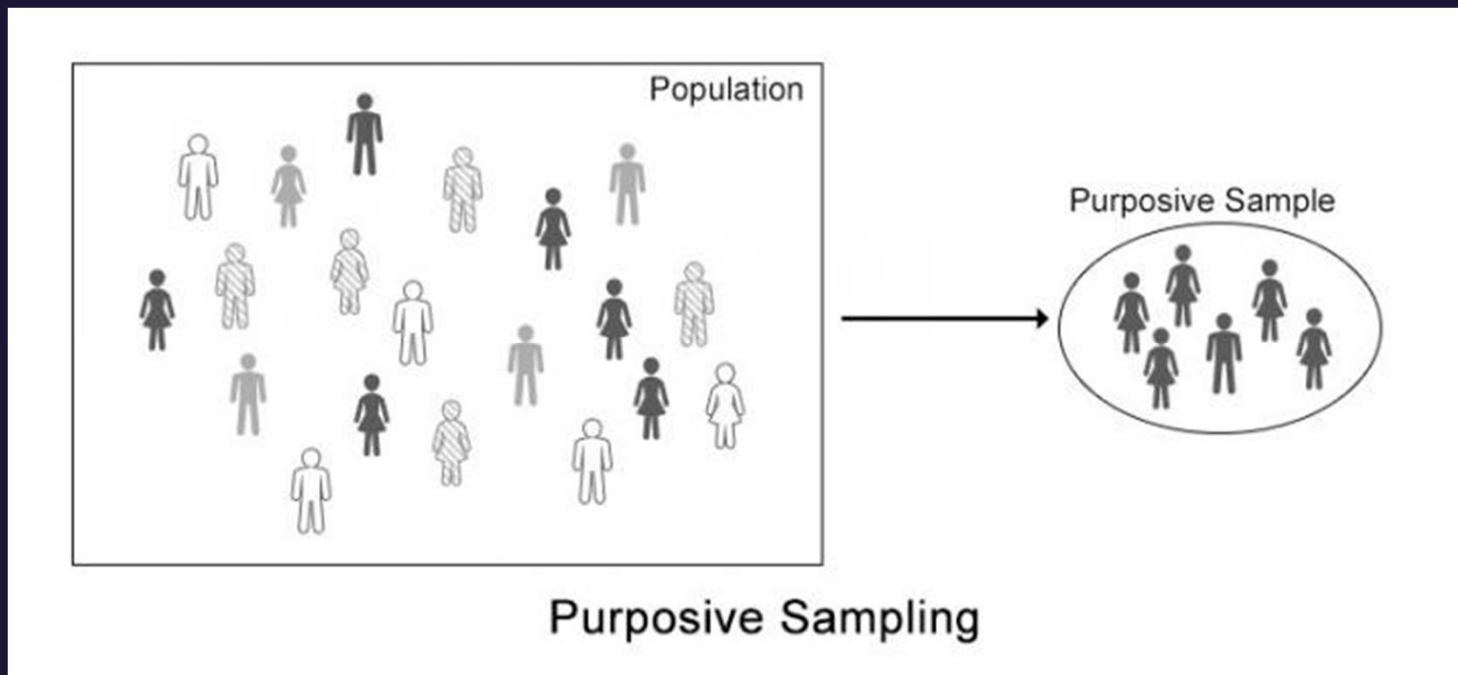
Participant selection and recruitment

- Understand CA mental health problems, appraise action
- Inclusive approach, those most directly affected/excluded
- Caregivers and CA of different ages/stages of education
- Gender balance



Purposive sampling

- Key characteristics to be eligible to participate
- Pragmatic, researchers use judgement and make decisions
- Some risks (non-explicit inclusion and exclusion criteria)



Inclusion/exclusion criteria

Inclusion criteria/considerations	Exclusion criteria/considerations
<ul style="list-style-type: none">- People residing in target population- People ≥ 18 years- Primary caregivers, carers and/or guardians (includes adoptive primary caregivers , kinship carers)- Primary caregivers of children 7-16 years- Primary caregivers of children in the intervention school- Primary caregivers of children in range of education stages (9 year basic school grades 1-9 in Rwanda; primary school grades 1-6 in Ethiopia)- Equal representation M:F	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Reasonable possibility of loss to follow up (e.g., familial commitments, chaotic and/or unstable personal circumstances, existence of severe or acute health condition that is likely to preclude participation)- Prisoners, people in detention or involuntary treatment- People who present a risk of physical aggression and/or harm- Equal representation M:F

Recruitment 1: Identifying participants



- Through school, through services, in local areas
- Use of pre-defined criteria
- Compiling an initial list – collaborators in local contexts/systems
- Inclusion of different perspectives, gender balance
- Appropriate permissions and agreements with traditional authorities

Recruitment 2: Invitation



- Recruiters connect (face-to-face, telephone) and invite to participate
- Informed consent: aims, objectives, activities
- Time to absorb information, time to ask questions
- PIC and IC: key ethical considerations/documents

Recruitment 3: Practicalities and ethics

- Fairness – not all parents will have access to a telephone
- Fairness – literacy of parents
- Teachers more likely to have mobile phones
- None will have access to email
- Provision of invitation letter and consent forms
- Consent forms completed and collated at first workshop
- Different forms of consent (written, thumb print or audio)



Recruitment 4: Ethical considerations

- Voluntary participation: information, time to make reasoned free decision
- Voluntary participation: encouragement versus coercion
- Informed consent: time commitment, incentives, recruiting friends/family
- Protection from harm: protection of identities: anonymity, confidentiality
- Protection from harm: Free to leave at any time, for any/no reason
- Times and locations of the first workshop to minimise disruption
- Information on Reference Groups
