majority of the members; by which means, laws have been passed, and taxes levied, for the profit and advantage of the

few, at the expense of the many.

"The Reform Bill will put an end to that evil, by giving to the people the power of electing their own representatives; and no class of his Majesty's subjects will benefit more by the Bill than the operatives.

"I rejoice that the operatives were among the foremost to petition for Reform, and that they have now accorded their

approbation of the plan submitted by Ministers.

"I beseech you to continue, by every means in your power, to support the King, his Ministers, and their plan of Reform, against the interested cry of the Universities, and Boroughmongers in England, and of the Freeholders, and self-elected Corporations of Scotland, who are now arrayed against their

King, his Ministers, and Reform.

"As you have resolved to consign your Petition to my hands, in the new Parliament, I shall, with pleasure, present it; and while I am sure, it will be cordially supported by Mr. Ross, the new Representative for Arbroath, Brechin, and Montrose, I shall not consider it honourable to see Mr. Ross supported by the Councils of Aberdeen and Bervie.
