

against the greatest opposition, then let them send Mr Oldman or Mr Clyne. Mr Oldman persevered for four years at the Police Board, thwarted and opposed in all his measures by twenty antis who had been sent along with him.

“Yet even though vanquished, he could fight it still.” He then was assisted by Mr Clyne, who was followed by seven other liberal men; but yet these nine have had hard work with such a preponderance of anti commissioners. The *Observer* will tell us, that these men are not rich enough to be sent to Parliament; why, then, let them have ten dollars a day each, as the Members of Congress in the United States of North America have.—To this it *must* come at last. The people are tired, and sick to death, and many are literally starving, from their being represented by rich men. It is but trifling to support the expense of a throne; but it is not by any means such a trifling thing to support the splendour of a Tory faction, and their profligate spawn. We would advise the *Observer* to induce his favourite candidate to use his interest in behalf of either of the above honest and worthy men. He cannot but feel strange and ill at ease in supporting a candidate, who has spent a long life in preventing him and us from having any vote in the election of a Member to represent us in Parliament.—He *must* feel not a little confused in going into the open air, having given such a vote as this.

We must apologize to Messrs. Clyne and Oldman, for having so unceremoniously dragged them before the public; but they ought to be aware, that they are public men, as identified with the Police of the city, and as such are fit subjects of dissection for the public lance. These gentlemen are held in estimation by the public, whose welfare they have at heart; we feel bound, as it is our duty, to point out to public notice such men as we approve of, as well as such as gratuitously offer their services.
