Following the Old Reformers came the chairmen and speakers and the official members of the Trades Council, marshalled by their president, Mr James C. Thompson. They carried in their front rank a large handsome banner, on which was inscribed a very appropriate text of Scripture—"They helped every one his neighbour, and every one said to his brother 'Be of good cheer.'" On the obverse side were the words—"Down with class privilege and give labour its due." Below this were the immortal lines of Burns—

It's comin' yet for a' that,
When sense and worth owre a' the earth
Shall bear the gree an' a' that.

The brass finishers, who at the ballot the other evening were fortunate in getting the lead in the procession as regards the individual trades, came next; and they made an appearance that fully justified their honourable position, their appearance carrying not only a handsome banner but also the insignia of their craft, which showed—to say the least of it—that they were not one whit behind their brethren in what is recognised as the higher branches of their art. Headed by their marshal, J. H. Still, they carried the insignia of their trade, including models of machinery, and a large banner bearing the inscription "The Death Knell of Hereditary
