their very simplicity. We are assured there is virtue in them if they are vigorously, perseveringly, and conjointly applied. None of them will work well separately, so as by itself to effect any great amount of good. There is no panacea yet discovered for all evils. Like a skilful physician, we have attempted to probe the different evils; and now bid you in faith apply the prescribed remedies. We have even sought out as far as possible the causes of these evils, and have directed you how to remove them. We have only now to add, "Let there be a long pull, and a strong pull, and a pull all together," and the work will be speedily accomplished. It is a great work, and it would be difficult to determine whether proprietors, tenant-farmers, or labourers would be most benefited by it. It is a good work; and they that strive most to bless others, shall themselves be most blessed.

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
