Duration: 12 months full-time or 24 months part-time (MLitt); 9 months full-time or 21 months part-time (PgDip)

Stage 3

PART TIME ROUTE

This route will run over two years. Up to 120 credit points can be taken in a single academic year, with students taking a maximum of 180 credits in total over the two years.

EL5906 Dissertation: Creative Writing Portfolio (60 credit points) must be taken in Year 2.

It is compulsory to take a minimum of 60 credits from the following courses, which can be taken in either Year 1 or Year 2:

Assessment: By a combination of coursework, written and oral examinations where appropriate for each course. The degree of MLitt shall not be awarded to a candidate who fails to achieve a CGS Grade D3 or above in EL 5906, irrespective of their performance in other courses.
