## **PART TIME ROUTE**

## September start

This route will run over two years minimum. Candidates can take up to 120 credit points in an academic year. LS501T must be taken in Year 1, and LS5904 must be taken in Year 2.

LS5590 International Human Rights Law (30 credit points) is a compulsory course and can be taken in either Year 1 or Year 2.

Candidates must take a remaining 90 credit points. At least 30 of these must be obtained from the courses in list A (Human Rights) below, and at least 30 from the courses in list B (Criminal Justice). The remaining credit points may be obtained from any Level 5 on campus Law 30 Credit courses (excluding LS501K and any of the Professional Skills courses, LS5905, LS5906, LS5907, LS5908, LS5909 and LS5913):

# January start

This route will run over three academic years. Candidates can take up to 60 credit points in Year 1 120 credit points in Year 2, and 60 credit points in Year 3. LS551T must be taken in Year 1, and LS5904 must be taken in Year 2.

LS5590 International Human Rights Law (30 credit points) is a compulsory course and can be taken in either Year 1 or Year 2.

Candidates must take a remaining 90 credit points. At least 30 of these must be obtained from the courses in list A (Human Rights) below, and at least 30 from the courses in list B (Criminal Justice). The remaining credit points may be obtained from any Level 5 on campus Law 30 Credit courses (excluding LS501K and any of the Professional Skills courses, LS5905, LS5906, LS5907, LS5908, LS5909 and LS5913):
