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Achieving Impact from your Research: Training Workshops

Workshop Programme 2013

Summary

This workshop series is designed for Aberdeen researchers to enhance the societal and economic impact of their research and more effectively engage end-users throughout the research process.

Aim

This workshop series will build capacity amongst the Aberdeen research community to design, undertake and disseminate research that achieves greater economic and societal impact.

Rationale

Building the capacity of research staff to enhance the impact of their work is essential to fulfil the University of Aberdeen's new strategic plan, which promotes impact-driven research within interdisciplinary themes, and recognises the unique needs of different disciplinary groups, ranging from biomedical sciences to the performing arts. Much effort is currently focussed on measuring and attributing impact retrospectively for submission to REF2014. There is an urgent need, however, to start looking forward to the next REF in parallel with this effort, and to build capacity for researchers to design and undertake new research with impact in mind.

Workshop Design and Timing

The workshop series is being hosted by the University of Aberdeen Centre for Sustainable International Development and the Researcher Development Unit. The programme has been designed in conjunction with the University of Aberdeen College Research Directors and the Theme Leaders for Energy; Environment and Food Security; and Pathways to a Healthy Life. Staff in Research and Innovation, Human Resources, Continuing Professional Development Services and University staff involved in RCUK priority themes have also been consulted.

The programme will begin with a launch event where John Baird, Lead for the RCUK Digital Economy Theme at the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC), will detail his personal and professional conceptions of impact, outlining examples of good practice, and what lessons these practices might hold for Aberdeen. Senior members of the University of Aberdeen will then conclude the session by reflecting upon impact's particular relevance for the University.

After the launch event, workshops will be delivered in two-hour sessions. usually over lunchtime with tea and coffee provided. The workshops are designed to be flexible so that participants can choose a range of sessions that best meet their needs.
